CVAMC: HEALTHCARE FOR HOMELESS VETERANS PROGRAM (HCHV) & TEAM COMMON QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

WHO IS A "VETERAN" ? Generically, anyone who served active duty in any branch of the military is considered a Veteran of the armed forces. When screening new homeless clients for Veteran status, ask "Have you ever served active duty in any branch of the military?" If the answer is "yes," assume this person may be eligible for services through VA.

ARE ALL VETERANS ELIGIBLE FOR SERVICES THROUGH THE VA? No. Some Veterans are not eligible for VA services. The most common reasons Veterans are found ineligible for VA services are an "other than honorable" discharge, inadequate active duty time, and military service in a National Guard or reserve unit that was never called to active duty status.

HOW DO I DETERMINE IF A VETERAN IS ELIGIBLE FOR VA SERVICES? You, or the Veteran, may call me at the number below and I will pursue verification of eligibility for your client. The fastest way to clarify eligibility is through review of the discharge document every Veteran is given - the "DD-214."

WHAT SERVICES ARE AVAILABLE THROUGH THE VA FOR HOMELESS VETERANS? A wide range of services including disability income, medical, mental health, and substance abuse treatment, reemployment support, and some transitional housing resources are available to eligible homeless Veterans. Clinical services are provided primarily at the Philadelphia and Coatesville VA hospitals and through community based Outpatient clinics (CBOCs).

ARE VETERANS REQUIRED TO GET SERVICES ONLY THROUGH THE VA? No. Veterans are first citizens, and they have the right to access the entire range of health and human services for which any other citizen is eligible. In addition, by virtue of their Veteran status, they may access an additional tier of services through the VA. These additional VA based services, added to other community based homeless services, can often reduce the length of a homeless episode and set the stage for long term stable housing in the community.

What is HUD-VASH?

HUD-VASH is a long-term intensive case management program for homeless Veterans. Funding for HUD-VASH comes from collaboration between the US Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Department of Veterans Affairs. Eligible Veterans receive case management services designed to resolve current homelessness and prevent future episodes of homelessness. In addition, Veterans receive access to a Section 8 voucher, which can substantially subsidize housing rental costs.

Who is eligible for HUD-VASH?

Each VA medical center has a limited number of vouchers; not all veterans who are eligible will be able to have a voucher. Veterans must be homeless to be eligible. The eligible population includes chronically homeless Veterans, Veterans with disabilities, and Veterans with children in custody, OEF/OIF Veterans, and women Veterans. Veterans with felony convictions in most cases are eligible. Veteran homeless status is verified and determined by the HUD-VASH admission committee. Veterans must also meet income guidelines.

What are the requirements for participation in HUD-VASH?

Veterans must demonstrate a case management need and a willingness to participate in case management activities for the duration of their utilization of the Section 8 voucher. Veterans must be willing to sign a contract, agree to medical and behavioral health treatment recommendations, to participate in service and treatment planning, and to regular case management contacts. Additionally, Veterans must agree to all requirements of the local Public Housing Authority, who administers the Section 8 voucher.

What is the length of time it takes to obtain housing? Where can Veterans live?

Length of time can vary, but generally Veterans can move into housing within 3-6 months from their date of referral to the program. Veterans may live in independent settings in the areas covered by the Coatesville VA Medical Center, which includes Chester Co, Montgomery Co and Delaware Co. Veterans will choose their rental units with the assistance of their case manager. Additionally, after one to two years, vouchers are portable and Veterans may take them to designated areas of the US should they wish to re-locate, provided the VA Medical Center in the state/area where the Veteran wants to live has available HUD/VASH vouchers and available case managers available to provide case management services.

What services do Veterans receive through the program?

Veterans will be offered the full array of services through the VA Medical Center and Homeless Service Program and can be referred for assessment of eligibility for VA financial benefits. Veterans will receive direct and indirect assistance with any case management need which is identified on their service plan, and may include life skill training, advocacy, clinical assessment and support, and linkage to and coordination with community providers.

How long does the program last?

The program lasts as long as the Veteran is in need of the voucher assistance due to income and functional status.

How does the Veteran access this program?

Referrals are taken through a Veteran's social worker, if applicable, when vouchers are available; frequently, there are no vouchers available. Only the social worker assigned to the Veteran can make a referral. For Veterans residing in residential programs, the referral will need to be made by the VA GPD Liason. If a Veteran is currently homeless in the community, homeless outreach social workers can be contacted (see pp. 123-124) for immediate assistance. This will not automatically result in a HUD-VASH voucher.

Currently in Philadelphia the Salvation Army operates three comprehensive shelter programs, two transitional housing programs, and a thirty day shelter program for troubled adolescents, with a total capacity for 385 people per night:

The services are available to single-parent families, single women, single men, married couples, children awaiting placement in a foster home, and dual-parent families. Through Family Services, The Salvation Army provides a wide spectrum of assistance for not only families, but individuals as well. The staff work with individuals and families who are experiencing financial difficulty due to illness, unemployment, fire, other natural disasters and those who are working to get off of welfare. Case workers help people in need obtain utility, food and rent assistance. They also offer counseling and support services to victims of domestic abuse as well as referrals to other agencies for additional support and assistance.

Homeless prevention is very important to Family Services. To prevent homelessness caseworkers provide clients with money management counseling, schedule bill payments, make appointments and assist with other matters.

The Salvation Army provides shelter and an array of supportive services for up to 120 homeless women, single parent families, and dual parent families each night at the Red Shield Family Residence. The Red Shield Family Residence's overall program is designed to help people break out of the sort of "conspiracy" of circumstances and choices that led to their end predicament of homelessness. The typical service package delivered to a client at the Red Shield Family Residence includes:

Safe, drug-free lodging, 3 nutritious meals a day, health care (weekly on-site clinic, operated by Philadelphia Health Services), individual case work/plan, drug/alcohol counseling, child care, life skills workshops (e.g. budgeting, nutrition, stress management, etc.), job placement, parenting skills education, Graduate Equivalency Diploma (GED) classes, literacy/computer literacy classes, information/referrals, sexual/child abuse prevention workshops, intensive "aftercare" support after graduation from the program, referral to a broad network of other Salvation Army services and programs.

The Child Care and Parenting Program are a unique feature of this shelter program and an essential component of the overall recovery approach. The Salvation Army operates a day and evening child care center that provides critically needed care for the children, who are facing the uncertainties, setbacks, fears, and stresses involved in homelessness. Provision of child care also enables the parents to invest themselves in: searches for employment and permanent living arrangements; medical or social service appointments; parenting education and life skills sessions; literacy or drug/alcohol recovery programs; classes at Community College of Philadelphia and other institutions; and emotional / physical respites from the sometimes overwhelming responsibility of caring for their children. The parenting education curriculum supports parents in learning how to nurture and effectively discipline their children through nonviolent, age-appropriate management techniques. One notable goal of these sessions is to prevent child abuse, as many of our adult residents are in need of supportive educational intervention.

Eliza Shirley House is an emergency shelter facility with two missions: to provide short term lodging, meals and immediate needs to displaced families and single women city wide on weekday nights and over holidays and weekends; and to provide longer term residential counseling, social work and referral services to homeless single and pregnant women 18 or older, 365 days a year. Women are admitted to Eliza Shirley after being referred from O.S.H.A. while others who arrive in the evening without referral are lodged (space permitting) only until O.S.H.A offices reopen.

Eliza Shirley House provides safe, sanitary housing in a drug/alcohol-free environment. Nutritious meals are served and caring, experienced staff are on hand at all times. Qualified volunteers provide free legal services, medical care, and referral services.

The Salvation Army/Bridge House

Bridge House is a residential rehabilitation program for women recovering from drug and alcohol addiction. The program accepts single, homeless women with a history of drug and alcohol abuse. Each woman must prove abstinence from drugs and alcohol for a minimum of 90 days with corresponding attendance in A.A. (Alcoholics Anonymous)/N.A.(Narcotics Anonymous) and Outpatient drug/alcohol treatment programs prior to admission to Bridge House. The program has a capacity for 24 women. The average stay for each woman is one year. Resident on-site mentors help the women develop social skills, cultural values, and personal hygiene. The residents are required to actively participate in ongoing supportive treatment programs/services including A.A. or N.A., the G.E.D. program, vocational counseling, job placement, or other occupational training programs. Each woman must also invest 50% of her income into a savings plan which will ensure a financial resource for her to move into permanent housing at the end of her program period.
